Walpole, H. ed., *A journey into England in the year MDXCVIII*. By Paul Hentzner.

A garland of old historical ballads. 1600-1752. I. Marie Hamilton. II. Robert Oig. III. Willy and Mary.

Fragments of ancient poetry collected in the Highlands of Scotland, and translated from the Gaelic or Erse language, 1760. Being a reprint of the first Ossianic publication of James Macpherson.

Together with the sums of money and lands which they divided among themselves during their sitting (at least such as were disposed of by them publicly). From the London 1660 edition.

The impeachment of James, Lord Strange, son and heire apparent of William, Earle of Derby. By the Commons of England, of high treason. From the London 1642 edition.

Kisses: being fragments and poetical pieces on the kiss. From appendix of the 1803 edition of Johannes Secundus (d. 1536).

A marriage trivmphe solemnized in an epithalamivm, in memorie of the happie nuptials betwixt the high and mighty Prince Count Palatine and the most excellent Princesse the Lady Elizabeth. Written by Thomas Heywood. From the London 1613 edition.

The statesman's progress, or a pilgrimage to greatness. Delivered under the similitude of a dream. By John Bunyan. An anonymous parody of Bunyan's *Pilgrim's Progress*, the statesman satirized being Sir Robert Walpole. From the London 1741 edition.
